## Report of the trustees

Reference and administrative information set out on pages 1 and 2 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (effective from January 2019).

#### Introduction from our Chairman

I am honoured to have served as Chair of Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust during this most challenging of years. Our members, volunteers and supporters enabled another year of achievement for the Trust despite the significant impact of the COVID-19 emergency, which was felt throughout the year. The pandemic hit us hard. Later in this report we detail how it affected our performance, how we managed the risks and how COVID-19 will inevitably affect our future plans.

Despite COVID-19, in 2020, we were still able to achieve against many of our plans. Highlights of the year include: completion of our refurbished HQ at Robinswood Hill with café and visitor facilities, completion of the first year of the trial of the new national Environmental Land Management scheme, the continuing work of the ERDF Wild Towns project in seven market towns in Gloucestershire and the implementation of the Estate Review. I would like to thank the staff and my fellow Trustees for their hard work and dedication during a difficult year, and our supporters for their loyalty.

We continued to work through the year, often remotely rather than in person, with conservation partners, communities, public bodies and corporate partners. In particular, we remain very grateful for the continued support of Grundon Waste Management for so many of our projects through the Landfill Communities Fund.

The global pandemic is the third emergency we had to tackle in 2020. Hopefully, the impact of COVID-19 will lessen over the next year or two. However, the continuing and interlinked challenges of saving the county's wildlife and reducing the harmful impacts of climate change will be with us for much longer. We need nature and are part of nature. It is in our interest to halt and reverse declines in wildlife and the job of your Wildlife Trust to lead on nature's recovery in Gloucestershire, fostering the connection of people to wildlife and wild spaces.

# Objectives and activities

Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust's charitable objects (summarised) are:

- To record and study places and objects of natural interest, and to protect them;
- To establish, maintain and manage nature reserves;
- To encourage the preservation of species;
- To encourage study and research in the natural sciences;
- To advance the education of the public in sustainable development and biodiversity conservation;
   and
- To advance the education of the public in recycling and waste management and to promote sustainable practices.

Our vision is for more wildlife, more wild places and more people connected to the natural world.

The Trust's work is guided by a Strategic Plan and 2020/21 was the fourth year covered by the 2017-2022 Strategic Plan. In 2019/20 we conducted a mid-term review to confirm that the Strategic Plan was still fit for purpose. This resulted in a series of adjustments to the five-year objectives.

Each year the Trust annually produces a detailed Business Plan which determines the activities to be carried out during the year. Results are monitored throughout the year with quarterly performance reports being produced for the Board and examined in more detail twice a year by sub-groups of the Board.

The main headlines in the 2017-2022 Strategic Plan following the mid-term review are:

## Wildlife and Wild Places

- Informed by an estate review, we will move towards a bigger, better and more connected approach to our land management activities by developing a 20-year plan for 10 priority landscapes where we partner with other landowners. By 2022 we will manage 10% more land for wildlife by transitioning our estate towards a smaller number of larger nature reserves within these priority landscapes;
- We will improve the condition of the land we manage with 75% of nature reserves meeting targets
  for priority habitat quantity and quality. Our nature reserves will be more resilient with 10% of sites
  better connected to the Nature Recovery Network. We will establish a breeding pine marten
  population in the Forest of Dean; and
- We will improve urban wildlife by creating Wild Towns. These towns will have a network of wild spaces for people and wildlife. 50 hectares of urban wildlife habitat will be created or enhanced, and 5,000 people will be engaged.

## Your Wildlife: Inspiring Communities

- Our learning programme will help young people to appreciate and take action for nature. 30,000
  young people will be helped to experience wildlife through formal and informal outdoor learning
  provision, both at our sites and in school settings;
- By 2022 we will have achieved 45,000 active volunteer hours annually. This will be achieved via
  the delivery of our new volunteer strategy which will ensure that volunteers are involved in
  everything that we do, tackling barriers and challenges to volunteering; and
- We will establish campaigns to inspire people to act themselves. We will develop a suite of actions that are credible and authentic, genuinely worthwhile and with impact for nature and wildlife, based on evidence.

# **Natural Solutions**

- We will continue to expand Building with Nature and support the subsidiary to promote green infrastructure standards. By 2022 two further developments will have achieved the benchmark, creating net gains for wildlife, working with nature to reduce the risk of flooding, and providing better quality places to live;
- Participants in our community programmes will have better access to, understanding and appreciation of nature as well as having improved health and wellbeing. Of participants, 80% will have improved access to nature and 60% will have increased appreciation of nature;
- Gloucestershire has embarked on a number of transport, employment and infrastructure projects.
  We will negotiate with key decision makers as early as we can to make sure schemes consider
  impact on the environment from the start and secure biodiversity net gain. We will talk to all key
  politicians to make sure that Gloucestershire's wildlife is protected and enhanced; ensuring
  schemes provide the best deal for wildlife; and
- We will proactively build our relationships with farmers, landowners and key estates in the county.
   We will invest in developing our offer to farmers and landowners and develop a new model for GWT environmental farm advice with an economic model to sustain it.

## **Extending our reach**

- We will increase the number of active supporters of our work from a baseline of 40,800 in 2019 to
  42,500 by 2022, improving the experience for visitors to our wild places, especially around our
  Gateway Sites and visitor centres. We will transform our relationships with members and
  supporters with more personalised communications;
- We will rationalise our subsidiary companies and improve their returns to the charity. We will develop individual giving (non-membership support) in new sources, channels and methods of giving;
- We want to develop and manage our people, buildings and resources to support delivery of our plans. We need to invest in the training and development of our staff and volunteers to ensure an engaged and productive workforce; and
- We will develop a sustainability policy to give our supporters, staff, volunteers, and suppliers an
  overview of our on-going commitment to protecting and enhancing the natural world. Our policy
  will be applied to all aspects of our operations; offices, estate management, project delivery,
  cafes and visitor centres.

The Trust spent £3.5m during the financial year of which 77% was sent supporting wildlife and wild places. 11% was spent on fundraising activities and 12% related to the costs in the trading subsidiaries that provide ecological consultancy, cafés and visitor facilities at three gateway sites in Gloucestershire.

Volunteers provided 14,202 hours of activity for a total value of £202,019. The number of hours was lower than in recent years due to the impact of COVID-19 on office-based volunteering, the size of conservation work parties and on engagement work. Where restrictions allowed, volunteer activity included supporting the land management team, assisting with survey and monitoring, the Trustee role and communications.

We have referred to the notes contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit reporting when reviewing our objects and aims and in planning for future activities. The Trustees have considered how future plans included in the business plans and future strategies will help to achieve these objects and aims.

# Achievements and performance

The COVID-19 pandemic has had a significant impact on achievements and performance throughout the year. Having signed-off a Business Plan for the year in February 2020 it had to be rapidly rewritten as it became apparent that many of the plans would be difficult to achieve. The main impacts of the pandemic on our achievements and performance have been:

- Several funded projects were paused during the course of the year meaning that achievement of objectives and funding claimed in arrears were delayed;
- Face-to-face recruitment of new members, a vital source of income, was not possible for a significant portion of the year due to lockdown restrictions;
- Face-to-face engagement with new and traditional audiences was only possible for a limited part of the year; and
- A reduction in funding opportunities resulted in fewer new projects.

Despite the impacts of the pandemic, the Trust has achieved a good proportion of the objectives in the revised Business Plan for 2020/21.

## Wildlife and Wild Places

#### **ERDF Wild Towns**

Much of the work of the ERDF (European Regional Development Fund) Wild Towns project was able to continue safely during the course of the lockdowns, albeit with some delays. The project aims to create, connect and enhance green spaces for wildlife in seven towns across Gloucestershire. Work has included fencing and grazing (Cinderford), access steps and footbridge (Cirencester), willow pollarding for water voles (Fairford), stream restoration (Tetbury), hedge planting (Moreton-in-Marsh) and linear orchard restoration (Stroud and Stonehouse).

# **Completion of the More Hooves for Horseshoes project**

We completed the delivery of the More Hooves for Horseshoes project in the Forest of Dean. This comprised various works to benefit local bat populations including fencing, livestock handling facilities, management of invasive species and the purchase of native breed sheep for conservation grazing. The project also included coppicing and thinning of woodland edges to improve foraging habitat and flight paths for bats together with improvement to bat roosting habitat.

#### Ash dieback works

Ash dieback is a fungal disease of ash trees which is affecting woodlands throughout the UK. Dead and dying ash trees pose a health and safety risk and we have therefore enhanced our annual tree safety inspections on all GWT reserves. A large-scale felling programme has been delivered on all high risk areas adjacent to properties, car parks and highways throughout the GWT estate. This has involved extensive felling at Lower Woods, Crickley Hill, Frome Banks, Barrow Wake, Daneway Banks, Sapperton Valley, Siccaridge Woods, Coopers Hill and many other sites.

## **Estate Review**

We started to implement the recommendations of the detailed review of all of the land that we own or manage. The review was based on the principles of the 2011 Lawton Review recognising that the Trust's land management work needs to deliver more, bigger, better and joined up places for wildlife. We have now withdrawn from all non-owned sites with a low ecological score which did not have a current tenancy agreement. We have worked on legacy plans for nine owned sites which had low ecological scores. Alongside this work we have begun the process of developing visions and aims for the priority landscapes aligned with the Nature Recovery Network.

# Return to the Hill project

We started the Return to the Hill project. This project was delayed by COVID-19 but we were able to recruit a new project officer who concentrated on elements of the project that do not require face-to-face engagement. This included planning of events, project officer training and the creation of a launch video. This project will celebrate the story of Robinswood Hill, improve accessibility and celebrate cultural diversity.

## Online learning

COVID-19 prompted us to revisit our delivery model for learning. With face-to-face learning challenged by restrictions we created a series of online formal learning sessions for primary and secondary schools. We also put informal learning activities online and engaged with more than 4,000 people in this way.

## Cheltenham Drop-in Garden project

We completed the Cheltenham Drop-in Garden project. This project took a neglected, under-used piece of land in central Cheltenham and we worked with local communities to create a haven for people and wildlife. When restrictions permitted, the garden provided leisure and training opportunities for those wishing to learn wildlife-friendly gardening skills.

# **Natural Flood Management**

We have continued our long-term programme of watercourse improvements. Natural Flood Management measures have been implemented on the River Twyver including the installation of 'leaky dams' to slow the flow of water and reduce the impacts of flooding further downstream. We worked with partners to create functional healthy watercourses for people and wildlife in urban areas by establishing two demonstration rain gardens in Gloucester to help reduce the risk of flooding while also attracting pollinating insects.

## **Environmental Land Management trial**

We completed the first year of working with the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs on a trial to inform a new national Environmental Land Management scheme, leading a partnership of five Wildlife Trusts engaging farmers to see how the new scheme can create more space for nature in Gloucestershire's farmland.

#### **Building with Nature**

Our Building with Nature framework for green infrastructure standards continued to grow across the county, supporting new housing, infrastructure, and commercial development to meet the evidence-based standards for wildlife, water and wellbeing developed by GWT. We increased our work with local planning authorities in the county, encouraging them to adopt the standards in policy documents and encourage key developments to seek accreditation. Wild Service, our ecological consultancy, worked with Cirencester College to advise on improvements to the college and its grounds.

## **Extending Our Reach**

# Robinswood Hill HQ and wildlife discovery centre

After delays caused by the pandemic, the building works at Robinswood Hill were completed in summer 2020. This included a refurbished HQ together with a visitor welcome, café and community hub. Sustainability was an important consideration in the design of the buildings, with improved insulation, natural ventilation, external cladding from our own nature reserves and a sustainable drainage system collecting rainwater and directing it into rain gardens.

#### Young Ambassadors Board

We created a Young Ambassadors Board to support and shape the delivery of our strategy and to enhance young people's representation at GWT which was initiated by our young trustee, Rosemary McCloskey. Interviews took place and eight young people accepted the offer of a role on the Young Ambassadors Board for 2021-22.

# Increasing our online presence

In response to COVID-19 we expanded our online presence. With enhanced digital content, we saw a significant increase in visits to the web site and followers of our social media channels. We engaged with many new audiences and had an increase in online membership sign-ups.

#### Financial review

The Trust's total income to 31 March 2021 increased by 6% to £4,793,014 (2020 £4,530,716). While charitable and trading activities reduced in the year as a direct impact of the pandemic, there was a generous and unexpected increase in the volume of legacies to £617,075, including a substantial legacy restricted to land acquisition.

Expenditure reduced by 10% to £3,533,511 (2020 £3,943,486) of which 50% was the reduced costs of operating the subsidiaries, 38% was in charitable activities while projects slowed during the lockdowns and 12% in fundraising costs while face-to-face recruitment was paused.

Trading activities reduced by 8% to £618,970 (2020 £670,978) and a healthy profit of £194k was generated (2020 £43k). This improvement was due to profitable performance in commercial operations and in the stand-alone ecological consulting business following the closure of the land management business in the prior year. The cafés achieved a breakeven position despite the extended lockdowns as some staff were furloughed and others operated a reduced takeaway service when government restrictions allowed. To streamline operations and administration, the Gloucestershire Wildlife Management subsidiary was merged into Gloucestershire Wildlife Enterprises on 1 April 2020.

The restricted net income of £687k is due to legacies of £405k for the purchase of land, and £282k received for funding projects which will begin in 2021-22. The unrestricted net income of £702k is a combination of: the profitable performance of the commercial subsidiaries £193k which resulted in gift-aid donations towards the Trust's work; income and gains on investments of £132k; legacies of £212k; and a successful emergency appeal and cost saving programme £165k. Together, this has enabled the Trust to replenish emergency reserves used during the COVID pandemic and designate £275k for urgent capital improvements and repairs.

Throughout the early months of the year a small working group of Trustees met fortnightly to oversee the Trust's response and to monitor the impacts of the pandemic. This included regular reviews of the Risk Register. The Finance and Remuneration Panel (a committee of the Board) continued to monitor financial risk on a quarterly basis. From October, Performance & Projects Group (another sub-group of the Board) resumed its scrutiny role of the non-financial risks. All groups reported in writing to the full Board of Trustees.

The Senior Management Team reviewed the Risk Register on a quarterly basis, suggesting adjustments to the relevant sub-group.

We mitigated the risks to our income associated with the pandemic by:

- Taking advantage of the Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme for staff who were unable to continue to do their jobs either because of the nature of their work or their personal circumstances;
- Applying to emergency pots of funding;
- Delaying the start of new projects and negotiating new end dates of existing projects to reduce short-term expenditure;
- The creation of Response and Recovery Plans;
- Undertaking a scenario planning exercise to forecast the likely impact of lockdowns and an
  economic downturn on income and adjusting our expenditure accordingly:
- Continuing our programme of income diversification; and
- A restructure of the organisation with the loss of several posts.

The Trust participates in a defined benefit pension scheme that was closed to its members in 2005. Valuations by a qualified actuary are completed every third year and the Trust's share of the deficit is recalculated and accounted for in the balance sheet liabilities. The latest valuation was completed in April 2020. The accounts are prepared using financial reporting standard FRS 102 as the basis for the valuation at the balance sheet date. This uses factors such as the annual consumer price index (CPI) to calculate the potential increase in costs and a discount rate using the yield of Corporate AA bonds at the last day of the financial year. The resulting balance at 31 March 2021 was a liability of £59,166 (2020 £91,967). The movement after in year contributions has been reflected in the Statement of Financial Activities as Other Recognised Losses.

The investment portfolio is managed by Rathbone Greenbank on behalf of the Trust. The overall value at year-end was £659,112. The investment policy was reviewed by the Finance and Remuneration Panel in-year with some resulting changes to the risk appetite and ethical investment preferences. Investments are managed on a discretionary basis:

- with a low investment risk mandate;
- with a bias to capital rather than revenue returns;
- such that assets can be realised to cash at short notice if required;
- funds are invested following the principles of Socially Responsible Investing (SRI);
- by an advisor and fund manager with proven charities fund management expertise; and
- the Finance Panel will consult with the advisor annually to review investment.

#### The principles of SRI investing are:

- to invest in companies that make a positive contribution to society;
- use our investor influence to encourage best practice management of social responsibility issues;
   and
- avoid investing in companies whose activities conflict with the objectives and mission of the Trust performance.

## Financial reserves policy

The Trustees reviewed the financial reserves policy and the target financial reserves during the year and decided to increase the reserves threshold from at least three months to at least four months of coverage. The Trust now endeavours to have sufficient financial reserves to meet its contractual and financial obligations, based on the unrestricted salaries and other unrestricted costs, for a period of at least four months in the event of a sudden decline in income. This target amount is covered first by the unrestricted net current assets of the organisation. The balance is included in the long-term investment portfolio. During the COVID-19 lockdown, business operations paused, and some use of the emergency funds was necessary, which along with emergency funding schemes met the cash needs of the entity in the early stages of the pandemic. As and when commercial operations were allowed to restart, profits were channelled into rebuilding the emergency reserves. By year-end these were sufficient to meet the target minimums.

The unrestricted general funds balance increased to £2,460,744 (2020 £1,896,052). Total funds held were £6,859,278 (2020 5,491,660)

The Trustees consider that the charity will continue as a going concern for a period of at least 12 months from the date on which these financial statements are approved for the following reasons:

- The charity holds free reserves, defined as total cash and listed investments, less future forward restricted commitments of £1,097,129, of which £650,000 are emergency reserves;
- There is a pipeline of funded projects which are sufficiently resourced;
- A mid-term review of the strategic plan was completed and there is a fit for purpose organisation to deliver the plan; and
- Commercial operations have reopened following the lifting of government restrictions.

The Trustees therefore consider it appropriate to adopt the going concern basis for the preparation of the accounts, as detailed in note 1(c) to the financial statements.

# The Trust's approach to fundraising

The Trust is registered with the Fundraising Regulator (FR) which means we have the required complaints log and procedure in place. We also comply, as required by the FR registration, with the Code of Fundraising Practice. We approach fundraising with honesty, openness and are respectful of our supporters.

Our fundraising promise is available on our website. The Trust is committed to ensuring that supporters are happy with the level of communication they receive from us. We ensure that all our activities, and those of the companies who work on our behalf, adhere to best practice guidance, as well as legal requirements. The Trust works with a third-party professional fundraising organisation: South West Wildlife Fundraising Limited (SWWFL), which carries out our face-to-face membership recruitment. Their performance is monitored closely and a Trust staff member sits on the SWWFL Board.

The Trust has a Safeguarding Children Policy and a Safeguarding Adults Policy. Fundraising activities are regularly reviewed to ensure that we recognise that someone might be vulnerable and take care to protect them. We ensure the frequency of our communications is appropriate, we do not persistently contact anyone, and do not employ high pressure fundraising approaches.

We work hard to ensure that our systems and processes are fully compliant with the data protection legislation.

## Plans for future periods

We anticipate that COVID-19 will continue to have an impact on our plans during 2021/22. Grant funding opportunities are not expected to recover to pre-pandemic levels quickly. Any further lockdowns or restrictions will impact on face-to-face recruitment of new members and engagement with our supporters. Restrictions might also result in further pausing of projects with associated delays in delivery and potentially grant payments. If the economy fails to recover sufficiently then we might experience more membership cancellations and a downturn in the income generated by our subsidiaries.

# Celebrating GWT's 60th Anniversary

In November we plan to celebrate the Trust's 60th Anniversary. There will be various 60th anniversary related activities taking place during the year culminating at the AGM.

## Wild Trainees project

We will deliver the Wild Trainees project which aims to create the first vocational training scheme in Gloucestershire for 18-25 year-olds developing the skills and knowledge needed to work in a variety of land management roles.

#### Rebuilding Landscapes for Nature's Recovery in Gloucestershire

We will continue the delivery of the Rebuilding Landscapes for Nature's Recovery in Gloucestershire project, secured through the Green Recovery Challenge Fund. The project includes work on nationally threatened species and priority habitats in the 'Golden Valley' between Stroud and Cirencester and in the Forest of Dean.

## Severn Wildbelt

We will work with partners to develop a vision for a Severn Wildbelt. The concept of a 'Wildbelt' has been promoted by the Wildlife Trusts with Government support as a new designation to support nature's recovery. It will enable land that is currently of low biodiversity value to support nature's recovery, help join up high value sites, and so speed the creation of the Nature Recovery Network.

## Community empowerment

We will explore new routes to engagement, putting the skills, knowledge and power in the hands of the people and encouraging others to take action for nature. We will create a toolkit and will empower three communities to take action.

## Structure, governance and management

The Trust is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 21 November 1961 and registered as a charity on 28 April 1964.

The Trust was established under a Memorandum of Association which sets out its objects and powers. Those objects are now deemed to be included in the Trust's Articles of Association by virtue of the Companies Act 2006.

#### Organisational structure

The Board of Trustees consists of the Chair, a Vice-Chair and other members up to a maximum total of 16 members. Currently, there are 12 full members of the Board. The Board may also co-opt members from time to time to gain specialist input or skills.

All newly appointed trustees undergo two half-day induction sessions to introduce them to the constitution, current strategy and Business Plan of the Trust and to brief them on their obligations and responsibilities under charity law. Any interested person may apply to join the Board of Trustees through the advertisements placed in the Trust's magazine and on the Trust's web site. Any interested person must be a member of Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust before he or she will be considered for appointment to the Board. Election of new Board members normally takes place at the AGM. Responsibility for day-to-day operational activities lies with the Chief Executive who reports to the Board of Trustees.

## Connections to a wider network

The charity is a member of the Wildlife Trusts Partnership (incorporated as the Royal Society of Wildlife Trusts, registered charity number 207238) which acts as an umbrella body carrying out lobbying and public relations on behalf of all Wildlife Trusts. Nationally, there are 46 Wildlife Trusts in the UK with more than 850,000 members. Partners can use the Wildlife Trusts' logo and benefit from the resources, best practice and speciality experience of other member Trusts. Membership gives the Trust a national voice and profile, as well as identification with the conservation work of the other Wildlife Trusts. However, each member of the partnership remains entirely independent in terms of governance.

Regionally, the Trust is also a member of a charity, the South West Wildlife Trusts, registered charity no. 1094746. Collectively, with six other county Wildlife Trusts in the South West of England, we have over 150,000 members, look after more than 30,000 acres of nature reserves and annually spend around £19 million for the benefit of people and wildlife in the region.

## Related parties

The Trust had two trading subsidiaries at 31st March 2021. Gloucestershire Wildlife Enterprises (registered company number 09706354) is a wholly owned subsidiary of Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust that manages our catering business, ecology consultancy and other trading activities. Gloucestershire Wildlife Management Limited (registered company number 02284477) trading as Wild Service which provided ecological consultancy ceased trading from 1st April 2020 and was merged into Gloucestershire Wildlife Enterprises.

A further trading subsidiary, Build with Nature (registered company number 11283471) provides training and accreditation services for the Building with Nature benchmark.

## Statement of responsibilities of the trustees

The trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102: The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The trustees are required to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and the group and the incoming resources and application of resources, including the net income or expenditure, of the charity and the group for the year. In preparing those financial statements the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the applicable Charities SORP;
- make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the group will continue in operation.

In so far as the trustees are aware:

- there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditors are unaware;

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charitable company's website. Members of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £100 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up. The number of members at 31 March 2021 was 13 (2020: 13). The trustees are members of the charity but this entitles them only to voting rights. The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

Godfrey Wilson Limited were re-appointed as auditors to the charitable group during the year and have expressed their willingness to continue in that capacity.

# 1. Accounting policies

## a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities in preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

# b) Group accounts

These financial statements consolidate the results of the charitable company and its wholly-owned (controlled) subsidiaries on a line by line basis. Transactions and balances between the charitable company and its subsidiaries have been eliminated from the consolidated financial statements. Balances between the two companies are disclosed in the notes of the charitable company's balance sheet. A separate statement of financial activities, or income and expenditure account, for the charitable company itself is not presented because the charitable company has taken advantage of the exemptions afforded by section 408 of the Companies Act 2006.

## c) Going concern basis of accounting

The accounts have been prepared on the assumption that the charity is able to continue as a going concern, which the trustees consider appropriate having regard to the current level of unrestricted reserves. The COVID-19 pandemic has had a profound impact on the global economy and has impacted the charity. The trustees have considered the impact of this issue on the charitable company's current and future financial position. The charity holds general funds of £2.76m and a further £129k in designated funds that can be drawn down if necessary. Cash flow is healthy, with a year end cash balance of £1.6m and a further £659k in investments which could be liquidated if required. The charity has made use of the government's Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme in the year and received emergency funding from Gloucestershire County Council through the Business Rates scheme. An organisational restructure was undertaken midyear to reduce core operating costs while ensuring that resourcing and the structure of the organisation was appropriate to deliver the mid-term review of the strategic plan. Emergency financial reserves were reviewed and minimum levels increased to provide additional resilience. The Trustees consider that the charity has sufficient cash reserves to continue as a going concern for a period of at least 12 months from the date on which these financial statements are approved.

## d) Funds accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of the charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity. Endowment funds have been given to the charitable company for a particular purpose to be used in accordance with the wishes of the donor. The capital can generally not be realised.

# 1. Accounting policies (continued)

# e) Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Donations, gifts and subscriptions to the charity are included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable.

Rental income is credited to the statement of financial activities in the period to which it relates.

Income from contracts is recognised according to the stage of completion of the contract.

Grants receivable are accounted for when there is sufficient information to enable the claim to be made or the claim has been made and there is clear indication to suggest the claim will be met.

Where unconditional entitlement to grants receivable is dependent upon fulfilment of conditions within the charity's control, the incoming resources are recognised when there is sufficient evidence that conditions will be met. Where there is uncertainty as to whether the charity can meet such conditions the incoming resource is deferred.

Membership income is recognised over the life of the subscription taking into account the type of membership involved. Life membership subscriptions are deferred and released over 10 years.

For legacies, entitlement is taken as the earlier of the date on which either: the charity is aware that probate has been granted, the estate has been finalised and notification has been made by the executor(s) to the Trust that a distribution will be made, or when a distribution is received from the estate. Receipt of a legacy, in whole or in part, is only considered probable when the amount can be measured reliably and the charity has been notified of the executor's intention to make a distribution. Where legacies have been notified to the charity, or the charity is aware of the granting of probate, and the criteria for income recognition have not been met, then the legacy is treated as a contingent asset and disclosed if material.

# f) Donated services and facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item, is probable and the economic benefit can be measured reliably.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

# f) Donated services and facilities (continued)

The Trust receives support from a wide variety of volunteers. A report is prepared to estimate the value of volunteer hours according to the Volunteer investment and Value Audit (VIVA) standards, which in 2021 valued these hours at £202,919. However, in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), general volunteer time is not recognised in the accounts.

# g) Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity: this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

## h) Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

The charitable company is partially exempt. Irrecoverable VAT is allocated to the appropriate cost categories.

The cost of raising funds relate to the costs incurred by the group and charitable company in raising funds for charitable work.

## i) Allocation of support and governance costs

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Governance costs are associated with constitutional and statutory requirements and include any costs associated with the strategic management of the charity's activities. These costs have been allocated between cost of raising funds and expenditure on charitable activities on the following basis which is an estimate, based on staff time, of the amount attributable to each activity:

## j) Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write down the cost of each asset to its estimated residual value over its expected useful life. The depreciation rates in use are as follows:

Land Not depreciated
Land and property improvements 1.5% - 25% straight line
Motor vehicles 25% straight line
Equipment 25% straight line

Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £1,000. Assets are reviewed for impairment if circumstances indicate their carrying value may exceed their net realisable value and value in use. Assets under construction are not depreciated until brought in to use.

# k) Investments

Investments held at the year end are valued at the current market value at that date. Investment income from dividends is included in incoming resources while realised and unrealised losses and gains on investments are shown separately on the statement of financial activities (SOFA). Realised gains and losses are calculated on investment disposals during the year as the difference between the opening market value and the proceeds received on sale. Unrealised gains and losses are calculated on investment holdings at the year end as the difference between the closing market value and the opening market value or purchase value during the year. Investments in subsidiaries are measured at cost less impairment.

## I) Stocks and work in progress

Stock is included at the lower of cost or net realisable value. Work in progress is recognised where contractual obligations are performed gradually over time and is valued at the stage of contract completion at the reporting date.

### m) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

## n) Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

# o) Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

## p) Financial instruments

The trust only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently recognised at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

# q) Pension costs (defined contribution)

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charitable company in an independently administered fund. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable under the scheme by the charitable company to the fund. The charitable company has no liability under the scheme other than for the payment of those contributions.

# r) Pension costs (defined benefit)

The charitable company participates in a defined benefit pension scheme. The scheme is a hybrid, multi-employer pension scheme. In 2005 the scheme was closed to new and existing members. Provision has been made for the Trust's share of the deficit, based on an actuarial valuation for the year ended 31 March 2020.

# 1. Accounting policies (continued)

# s) Finance and operating leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the SOFA over the period in which the cost is incurred. The trust has no finance leases.

# t) Accounting estimates and key judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and underlying assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

#### 21. Pension provision

The charitable company participates in a defined benefit pension scheme. The scheme is a hybrid, multiemployer pension scheme. In 2005 the scheme was closed to new and existing members. The charitable company is currently paying employer contributions at a rate of 16% of pensionable salaries to contribute to the deficit of the scheme.

Provision has been made for the Trust's share of the deficit, calculated based on an actuarial valuation of Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust's net share of the total pension scheme deficit dated 31 March 2020. **Engagement and Learning** 

While much of our work with schools and community projects was paused during the pandemic, some online activity was possible and preparation took place to engage younger people through the Our Bright Future programme, and for education at Greystones Farm. We continued to work with local communities on hedgehog habitats, enhanced green community spaces in Cheltenham and rain gardens in Gloucester. We are also working with the NHS to provide natural, relaxing spaces to help busy carers unwind. The return to a renovated HQ at Robinswood Hill has enabled us to engage with the local community to celebrate the heritage of the hill and provide further access and amenities at this green flag site.

Evidence, Eco-system restoration and Citizen Science

The record centre provides data for a wide range of local authority and other ecological projects. We continue to monitor the pine martens re-introduced last year into the Forest of Dean with Forestry England and are preparing for a further translocation. We started to map the habitats of Gloucestershire and are ground-truthing results with the help of volunteers.

Wilder landscapes and farming

We completed the first year of a DEFRA pilot for environmental land management payments. We continue to provide wildflower meadows and natural green spaces within towns across Gloucestershire. A generous legacy was received for land acquisition which will enable us to provide a bigger, wilder and more joined up landscape in one of our priority landscape areas. We have been undertaking extensive wetland restoration work in the Forest of Dean, Coombe Hill, Ashleworth and along the River Twyver. We also worked with Stroud District Council to restore Stroud Canals.

Partnership working

We continued to work with partners such as the Severn Vale Catchment Partnership, Local Nature Partnership, the Local Enterprise Partnership and to support our subsidiary Build with Nature to develop strategy and deliver conservation projects across the county.

Visitor engagement

We have a visitor centre and learning environment at Greystones Farm. The Head Office facility and community space were completed in 2020 and all are ready for use once government restrictions have lifted.

#### **Purposes of endowment funds**

Endowment funds represent those fixed assets that must be held permanently by a charity. In the Trust's case, the fixed assets relate to nature reserves either purchased by the Trust or transferred from Gloucestershire County Council and the Nature Centre at Robinswood Hill, Gloucester. Additions to the reserves and Nature Centre are added to the fund and depreciation on those assets is charged against the fund.

# 23. Movements in funds (continued) Purposes of designated funds

Pension provision adjustment

This designation reflects the reduction in value of the defined benefit pension fund liability using FRS 102, as determined by a qualified independent actuary in the year ended 31 March 2020. It was decided to designate funds released via the gain on revaluation in order to distinguish these funds from ordinary operational funding and to offset any future increases in the required provision.

Capital improvements and repairs

Designated for future capital improvements and repairs (storage solutions and facility improvements).
